2012 A Year of Progress

2012 was a year where VOSH/International continued to make progress in reducing avoidable blindness. Our chapters participated in 67 reported mission attending well over 100,000 patients. We conducted missions in 22 countries as well as 8 reported domestic clinics in the United States.

VOSH expanded its reach and numbers by granting provisional status to three new chapters; Texas, Puerto Rico and Peru. Two more chapters are close to being granted provisional status: Alberta and Oklahoma. We welcomed five new Student VOSH (SVOSH) chapters; the University of Incarnate Word in San Antonio, University of Gondar-Ethopia; two chapters in Columbia-El Bosque and FUAA Pereira, and the University of West Indies-Trinidad/Tobago. We increased our public profile by conducting exhibits at the AAO, AOA, SECO, Vision East, Vision West, Heart of American and numerous state association meetings. We published two newsletters and an annual report. Our Website continues to bring update information about our activities, events, the story of the month and offers a JOIN NOW online application.

We expanded awareness of our organization with your leadership taking part in several forums, seminars and events. We represented VOSH chapters and individual members with a voice at the World Council of Optometry (WCO), Vision 2020 USA, International Association for the Prevention of Blindness (IAPB) and other such meetings.

Internally, the VOSH Board of Directors ratified a new constitution, by-laws and protocols. We made progress on the implementation of a new 5 year strategic plan.

The Annual meeting in Phoenix celebrated the PAST 40 years since our founding by Dr. Franklin Harms, looked at the PRESENT activities of VOSH/International and our chapters, and explored the FUTURE with ideas to guide our endeavors to provide eye care to the underprivileged of the third world. We recorded the meeting giving chapters and individuals glimpses of the proceedings. You may view the highlights at www.vosh.org.

Our progress was helped by generous grants and donations from Vistakon, Cleinman Practice Management, Essilor and many others as well as with ongoing support from Optometry Giving Sight. The annual meeting was sponsored by National Vision.

Other grants from Optometry Giving Sight and the Esther Kahn Foundation advanced our Technology Transfer Program for collecting and disturbing donated ophthalmic equipment to schools and clinics in developing countries. Significant equipment contributions were made to LaPlata University Optometry school clinic in Argentina.

All and all, we moved forward toward our mission to facilitate the provision and the sustainability of vision care worldwide for people who can neither afford nor obtain such care.

Our Partnership with Optometry Giving Sight

VOSH/International is pleased to recognize the support provided by Optometry Giving Sight, which now totals \$375,000 since our partnership commenced in 2008. These funds have been used to support a range of sustainable vision care projects including the following in 2102:

Haiti The Vision Entrepreneurs pilot project was implemented by VOSH Pennsylvania to deliver prescription eyewear and sunglasses to poor people in remote parts of Haiti. 24 local people received training to help sell reading glasses and sunglasses to those in need.

Argentina Funds were donated to provide equipment for a vision center at La Plata School of Optometry and Optics in Argentina as part of their "Visual Health for All" program, which also promotes the important role of optometry and optometrists in primary eye health.

Afghanistan VOSH/International in partnership with Optometry Giving Sight has allocated funds to support a documentary film on the life of Dr. Tom Little, who was killed while on an eye care mission in Afghanistan. The film will be released in 2013.

Nicaragua Equipment was purchased to establish the first teaching laboratory at the Autonomous University of Nicaragua (UNAN). The laboratory was inaugurated on July 26th 2012 and has 3 full lanes and 10 practice refraction lanes, and will greatly assist the 50 students who graduate from the program each year.

Nicaragua A Population Study and Outreach/Referral Screening Program, which was undertaken in 2011, was published at the American Academy of Optometry meeting in October by lead investigator, Dr. Larry Hookway. The data for the quality of life and spectacle usage surveys was collected by trained local workers. Community health nurses screened and dispensed readers and ready-made equal sphere bifocals to an estimated 2,000 people.

VOSH Corps Funds have also been allocated to a new project to be launched in June 2013, in association with the Brien Holden Vision Institute, which will enable new graduates to do their residency at a School of Optometry in an underserved community in Africa or Latin America.

Finally, Optometry Giving Sight was also pleased to nominate Dr. Greg Pearl as an Eye Health Hero at the 9th General Assembly of the International Agency for the Prevention of Blindness in Hyderabad, India in September.

Building Local Capacity

The Need: Nicaragua Presbyopia Study

The World Health Organization estimates that 153 million people are visually impaired due to uncorrected refractive error. It estimates that 517 million are visually impaired due to uncorrected presbyopia.

In this study anyone over age 34 with unaided near vision equal to or worse than 20/40 were considered presbyopic. The study concluded approximately 81% of people in Nicaragua that are visually impaired at near due to uncorrected presbyopia do not have the spectacles that they need. Affordable spectacle lens options and increased manpower to examine eyes will be needed to elevate the problem.

Dr. Hookway estimated that it would take almost 400 VOSH clinics, each seeing 2500 people over the age of 34 to address the need of Nicaragua alone.



Nicaragua Pro-Vision Project

Walman Optical provided a five-year grant in 2007 to establish an eye care program in Nicaragua. The Pro-Vision clinic in Managua was established in 2009 as a part of this project. In 2012, the mobile clinics examined over 4,000 patients and over 500 in the Pro-Vision clinic. In October VOSH/International turned over the project to local control with direction from Dr. Jay Jordan and Dr. Greg Pearl. The Pro-Vision staff will continue to support VOSH clinic team working in Nicaragua.

A major outcome of this original project was the subsequent establishment of the UNAN school of optometry. This will ultimately create more availability of eye care for the population than the original vision imagined. The first class will graduate in 2014.



Vision Entrepreneurs in Haiti

One of the newly trained vision entrepreneurs said it is hard to describe just how much the readers program is helping people in his country. "It is a pleasure for me to participate in the program, because it gives me an opportunity to help many folks who otherwise would not be able to afford buying a pair of glasses," he said. "Helping my people makes me feel that I'm serving a purpose, that's saying a lot. I will never stop thanking you for giving me an opportunity to fulfill this purpose!"

Technology Transfer Program

The Technology Transfer Program collect usable ophthalmic instruments and equipment for distribution to schools of optometry and clinics in underserved countries. Support from the Esther Khan Foundation and Optometry Giving Sight make this a reality. Most of the materials are warehoused in Florida. This year an additional facility was established in Arizona. We were able to provide equipment to Argentina, Nicaragua, El Salvador, and Mexico.


Annual Meeting 2012
